As we gather together this Low Sunday, the first after the joy and celebration of Easter Day, we are reminded that the risen Christ meets us not only in the peak moments of faith, but also in the quieter, much more ordinary spaces of daily life.

Low Sunday is sometimes called 'Thomas Sunday', a time when we remember the disciple who struggled to believe until he saw the risen Lord for himself. In Thomas, we find honesty. A Statement on the death of His Holiness Pope Francis



The Methodist Church in Britain receives with deep sadness the news of the death of His Holiness Pope Francis, and gives thanks for his life and Christian witness.

Even to the final days of his long life, by his actions and his words, Pope Francis continued to set forth the gospel of God's love in Christ. He spoke plainly of the hope that is to be found in Jesus Christ, showed profound compassion for those who are poor and marginalised, and gave particular emphasis to God's demand for global justice. Through his papacy, Francis has fostered an openness to Christians sharing together in the Church's life and mission, in ways which have broken new ground for the Catholic Church. In all these ways, for many Methodists Pope Francis's witness to the Christian faith holds a special resonance, and his loss is deeply felt.

Methodists join in these days in prayer and sympathy with our Catholic sisters and brothers, who have lost their Holy Father, recognising the pain that this brings. Methodists will also offer prayers in the days ahead for the Catholic Church, as she navigates this period.

As God receives Pope Francis into God's arms of love, we pray that he may rest in peace and rise in glory.

everything for God and we can learn from them.

It tells us in the Bible in 1 Corinthians 1-vs2 that "He (God) has chosen you to be His holy people." In some Bibles it says he calls us to be or Saints. You can often see images of Saints with a halo in a church's stained-glass window. Saints were ordinary people who loved God.

We are all called to be Saints wherever we may be - at home, on the street, at work, at school, at church. We can do this by loving God and by "living with love." This means knowing that God loves us and then sharing God's love with everyone we meet by being kind, and generous and patient and caring.
