## Message from the Leadership Team (LT)

As I write, we are in the immediate aftermath of the Doncaster to Kings Cross train stabbings. At the moment it looks as though no-one will have died, but what a horrific event, the terror of which many of us can identify with. I pray that all affected, either physically or mentally, will receive the care and counselling necessary to make effective recoveries.

A hero of the event was the train driver. His quick action, clarity of thought and good communication meant the train stopped on a platform at Huntington station, where police and ambulances could attend. What presence of mind that was, and undoubtedly a life saver.

I'll be honest, I am slightly envious of people who, under great pressure, manage to act quickly and get it right. My style is to try and understand exactly what is happening before acting. I need information and detail. This takes time, and I am frequently told off for thinking too much about detail. My retort is that 'the devil is in the detail, you know '.

I was intrigued why we say "the devil is in the detail". Looking up the origins of this expression, I was surprised to find that it was originally "God is in the detail". That makes much more sense. As the source of creation, God knows the detail and is in a real sense in the detail. Science (from the Latin word scientia, "to know") is about discovering that detail - what a shame science is so often pitched against God. But what about us? There is a tremendous amount of detail in who we are, so much that I'm not even sure we know ourselves, let alone anyone else.

King David, that rather imperfect person, captures something of how detailed and complex we are. Psalm 139 starts "O Lord, you have searched me and known me", then at verse 14, "I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made". I don't know about you, but when I reflect on how I came to be the person I am, I can share with David the need to praise God for how fearfully and wonderfully made I am. And it is almost certainly a different 'fearful and wonderful made' to anyone else.

Which takes me back to the train driver. Rather than suppressing a slight sense of envy, perhaps I should be expressing thankfulness, not just to him but to God for the glorious differences in the details that make us who we are. My weakness was the train driver's strength, and it is the coming together of all our strengths and weaknesses that gives us opportunity to be hero's to each other. I think there is a challenge in there for each of us in the week ahead.

Fireworks were invented over

2,000 years ago in ancient


