A message from Rev Sam Funnell

Dear Friends,

Overwhelmed by love, deeper than oceans, high as the heavens. Ever living God, your love has rescued me.

These song words by Noel Richard have been a constant accompaniment to my last couple of months: reaching through the shock of sudden illness, the enforced but necessary time of recovery and the frustration and bewilderment of unexpected frailty of body, and at times, mind too.

These words have sung their way through all of that, and been expressed and 'enfleshed' by the loving kindness, support, prayer and sheer grace of <u>so many people</u> as they/you have sent me messages of good wishes, dropped off surprise packages in the manse porch, offered to help me – if I needed shopping, or cleaning or anything really, covered for my absence in the life of our church, the Circuit and the wider District.

I'm so grateful and those three words can't express that deeply enough – I have truly been 'overwhelmed by love'! At this time of year, as Advent unfolds and another Christmas approaches, perhaps we sometimes feel overwhelmed by God's love, maybe even to the point where we struggle to see how the Almighty, God of all-time and space, would contract Themselves to the point where They choose, freely and lovingly, to inhabit the confines of a

human body and be born of a human parent in that small

town of Bethlehem – to come 'enfleshed', as Immanuel – meaning 'God-With-Us', to come as Jesus – to show us what true love really <u>looks</u> like and <u>lives</u> like.

That's a lot to take on board, a lot to process; a whole 'heap of grace' to contend with – and yet this is the truth of our faith, the hope we profess...



'Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God...

God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his [God's/Their] only Son into the world so that we might live through him [Jesus]. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he [God/They] loved us and sent his [God's/Their] Son...'

(1 John 4:7 & 9-10a: New Revised Standard Version – Updated Edition, with [additions by SF])

God's overflowing, overwhelming love, is offered to us freely, graciously and constantly – perhaps it's good, vital even, that we have the season of preparation that is Advent, to give us the time and space to ponder this wonder; that we might be more ready, more open, more understanding of all that God offers us, through Jesus, this Christmas and always!

<u>A Prayer:</u>

Generous God – in the face of your immense grace, and love, and compassion – for each one of us,

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revealed so profoundly in Jesus: the baby in Bethlehem, the self-giving Saviour of the Cross; help us, this Advent, this Christmas, to open ourselves up more completely, to an inner, deeper, understanding and acceptance of all that you 'do', all that you 'are' and all that you offer us. P.S. Just in case you're wondering about my use of pronouns for God, as above (e.g. Their/They/Them), I've been enjoying toying with the idea that non-gendered pronouns, as well as not defining God as either female or male, can also be understood as encompassing the idea of God as Trinity, God as Community, God as plural not singular – or, if you like – GOD AS LOVE!

So I share this thought with you – partly so you don't think I've just done a lot of 'typos' in my writing but also to get you thinking too!

ROC Update



On 24th October, 111 people met at Trinity to take part in the ROC Woking conversation run by a steering group from Trinity and other local churches. It brought together individuals from the local Council, Police, other statutory agencies, education, faith and community groups, businesses and community-minded residents. The aim of the evening was to identify all the good community work taking place within the Borough, join some dots and identify gaps in provision.

The Mayor, Cllr. Louise Morales and Will Forster, M.P. welcomed guests to the evening, including the Lord Lieutenant, Michael More-Molyneux and High Sheriff, Shahid Azeem. During the event, leading figures in Woking including Leader of Woking Council, Cllr. Ann-Marie Barker and Head of Woking College, Bret Freeman shared their perspectives. Also speaking were Woking Community Hospice Clinical Operations Director, Tammy Stracey, Head of Woking Environmental Action, Ellen Pirie, lead at Woking Food Bank, Alison Buckland, CEO of Methodist Care Homes, Sam Monaghan, and Luke Greening, Police Community Support Officer for Woking.



It was a structured conversation following the pattern of the first ROC conversation in Woking four

years ago and similar community conversations held up

and down the country by national charity, Redeeming Our Communities. Delegates were gathered around tables of eight with table hosts who facilitated the conversation and scribes to capture everything that was shared.

There is already so much amazing community support work taking place within Woking and good working relationships between the statutory and voluntary sector. Our aim was for this 'conversation' to build on these links and maximise the effectiveness of community support being offered to Woking as well as exploring where the gaps in activity and greatest needs are. There was a real buzz about the evening and we are hoping to see new connections made and new collaborations to support our community.

The next step will be to produce a report from all the information gathered during the conversation, which will identify key issues facing Woking's communities and offer possible solutions. Needs coming out so far from the analysis show young people, mental health and isolation coming high on the list followed by elderly people and the need for suitable buildings for activities and organisations needing more volunteers.

SFLG ST FRANCIS

[December] Inspired by St Francis of Assisi the St Francis Leprosy Guild has cared for

people with leprosy for over 129 years. They operate in thirteen countries in Africa, Asia and in Brazil where leprosy is endemic, funding research projects, hospitals, rehabilitation centres and capital equipment. Around 200,000 people are still diagnosed with leprosy every year. Millions are living with leprosy's preventable effects - fear, blindness, amputated limbs, stigma and discrimination.




[January] Combat Stress provides clinical treatment and support for veterans from the British Armed Forces. Founded as the Ex-Servicemen's Welfare Society and now based in Leatherhead their first 'recuperative home'

opened in Putney in 1919. The focus is on the complex mental health issues that many military personnel face and which impact not only themselves but their families. Combat Stress is the UK's leading veterans' mental health charity. In their own words the work they do "is lifechanging and often life-saving. No one else does what we do."



[February] Mercy Ships is a faithbased international organisation that deploys hospital ships to some of the poorest countries in the world. As well as delivering vital, free healthcare to

people in desperate need, they help train healthcare professionals and improve related infrastructure. Founded in 1978 they have worked in more than 50 countries but are currently focused on sub-Saharan Africa where up to 69% of people live on less than £2 a day. Healthcare in these countries either doesn't exist or is unaffordable to the vast majority of the population.



Reflections on the "Ocean of the Heart: A Traveller's Bundle" by Indy Lee

As 2024 comes to an end, it has been over two years since my family moved from Hong Kong to the UK. As we approach our third Christmas here, I find myself reflecting on a meaningful event held over the past few months at Chinese Congregation Methodist Church Woking —the "Ocean of the Heart: A Traveler's Bundle".

This activity is like a journey of our heart steering along an ocean. The ocean is vast and deep, full of stories and emotions waiting to be uncovered and shared. As a theatre director, performer, and drama educator, I always believe that theatre is more than performing—it is a way to inspire creativity and express feelings. Through movement, speech, and storytelling, we can share our inner thoughts and emotions with others.

Since moving abroad, when people ask me if I have adapted to life in the UK, I often find it hard to answer. It feels like I'm both settled and yet still adjusting. I believe many in the Hong Kong community here feel the same way. That is why I organized this activity —not only to create a safe space for others to express their experiences but also as a way for me to listen and connect with others who share this journey.

"Ocean of the Heart: A Traveler's Bundle" is a journey to explore the inner self, searching for identity and belonging. Participants came with their own stories, sharing experiences of life in a new place—whether the pain of separation or the struggle to establish appropriate identity. These stories became bridges, deeply connecting us all. Over four sessions, each gathering centred on a Cantonese Pop song, a biblical figure, and a unique theme:

1 "Similarities and Differences" – The Lives of Hong Konger in the UK

In this session, we followed the story of Joseph, reflecting on how his life transformed through his colourful robe, servant's garment, prisoner's clothing, and royal attire. Participants explored the "similarities" and "differences" between each other, recalling the struggles and uncertainties of their early days in the UK and rediscovering the resilience that carried them through. One participant shared, "Even in a strange environment, we must hold on to our self-worth, just like Joseph standing firm on his faith even in prison."

2 "Stay or Leave" – The Possibilities and Impossibilities of Hong Konger in the UK

Inspired by Jeremiah 29, we discussed building a new life in a foreign land—constructing homes, planting gardens, and putting down roots. Participants shared memories of life in Hong Kong and compared them with their present experiences in the UK. The story of Jackie Pullinger and her ministry in Hong Kong's Kowloon Walled City inspired discussions on how things that seemed impossible in Hong Kong could become a reality in the UK. "Although we're far from home, new opportunities and hopes have emerged," said one participant.

3 "Goodbye and Not Goodbye" – The Gain and Loss of Hong Konger in the UK

In this session, everyone brought along an item with special significance and shared its story. These objects allowed us to revisit cherished relationships and memories that are hard to let go of. Through the story of Abraham offering Isaac, we reflected on the struggles of sacrifice and the inner strength it can bring. One participant shared, "Each time we let go, it becomes a chance to grow, helping us

better appreciate the people and things in our lives." Another said, "The hardest part to leave behind is the family I couldn't bring with me."

4 "Inheritance and Legacy" – The Present and Future of Hong Konger in the UK

In the final session, we explored Jesus's story to imagine the possibilities for identity and legacy. Using image theatre, we portrayed the past, present, and future, discussing the transformations we've undergone and how to bring our new hopes to life. Whether contributing to the community or retaining family and cultural traditions, participants found that their past experiences, while challenging, were gifts that helped them discover their place and meaning in this new environment.

Throughout the activity, there was laughter, tears, and moments of mutual comfort and encouragement. Everyone felt heard and understood. This wasn't just an activity—it was a haven for meaningful connections, a place to find warmth and belonging.

The **"Ocean of the Heart: A Traveler's Bundle"** reminds us that, like an ocean, our stories and emotions are vast and deep, connecting us in profound ways. I truly believe that sharing these stories can enrich our lives. I look forward to more opportunities in the future to journey with others, letting the spirit of "Ocean of the Heart: A Traveler's Bundle" continue to ripple through and inspire many more.



Trinity- Moving Forward



As most readers will already know, Trinity has recently had a tough time, needing to make difficult decisions about the staff we have employed and relied upon for many years. The need for redundancies arose from a financial difficulty that had been developing for a few years but particularly because we needed to replace fixed price contracts for energy supplies and the cost rose almost 300%. At the same time, the District Grants Committee which had supported our Mission for 5 years, felt their scarce money had to go elsewhere this year and so our grant application was rejected leaving a big hole in our finances. This process has been hard for all concerned, particularly the staff. We are celebrating their work over many years, in the coming weeks.

From the beginning of January, we will only have paid support from Daniela 4 mornings each week, and the office will be closed on Fridays. So, we have got to change what we do, how we do it and who does it! Remember that in our letter in September, we pointed to a great future ahead of us as Trinity is still a very good Church with a Mission, but that we would need your help. Whilst we undoubtedly face challenges, they can be overcome and we can look forward positively to continuing much of the good work going on at the moment, although perhaps we will do it differently. For example, plans are already in place to continue Friday Messy Fun Church, more help would be useful even on an occasional basis. It's great to see 3 or 4 toddlers plus mums worshipping with us regularly and so Sunday Junior Church is to continue but more obviously part of the Church by using the Family Room and spending part of

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their time with the main congregation. We have always had an excellent Pastoral System that cares for every member and adherent, led by Shirley and Allison. With a few tweaks that essential work will continue.

Foundry Worship is really well established now with up to 40 regular people coming each time. For some it is an additional service as they support a different church, but

that does not dampen their enthusiasm. They led our worship last Sunday, what a great service that was. Full of life and enthusiasm.



Daniela and I are working hard together to reduce the sheer volume of administrative work that needs to be done as we cannot handle it all with a much smaller team. That involves some hard decisions about which groups we can continue to accommodate and which ones we cannot. We have some great opportunities for cross cultural development and supporting those with learning or mental health (or both) needs, through some of the groups we will retain as tenants, but some other groups will be asked to find a new venue.

The key to our future is a wider involvement of our congregation as volunteers. No matter who you are, whatever specific talents you have (or think you don't have) and how much spare time you might have, we need your help. I read an article in The Horsell Resident, about the Lightbox, listing all the different things they offer, but how they rely totally on a team on 200 volunteers! Some give a lot of time, some very little time, some have special skills to offer, others are simply there to talk to people and help in a simple way, wherever help is needed. The good news is that some Trinity people have already agreed to help and others are thinking about helping in a specific way, and so we are learning how to better

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manage a wide range of volunteer offers. Please join the team! We don't expect you to be a Traffic Warden in the car park or to be always moving furniture, although that would be useful! But could you smile at people as they arrive, say hello and help them to find out where their meeting is. Perhaps you could clear away some mugs into the kitchen, do a bit of washing up and perhaps empty an occasional bin. Anything would be helpful; we just need to learn about flexibility and how to manage a team of volunteers.

Looking further ahead, we continue our conversations with leaders of the Chinese Church, about us working more closely together towards full integration in due course. In relation to this here is a reminder of two dates for your diary:

- Sunday 15th December 6pm Joint Carol Service with our Chinese friends: Lots of lovely music and carols to sing and readings to hear and think about;
- Sunday 2nd February 11am Joint Communion Service with Chinese friends to celebrate the Chinese New Year of the Snake followed by Chinese Banquet

There are other positive things on our Agenda such as creating a dedicated Prayer Space. This will be the room originally called The Creche, more recently The Family Room at the back of the Sanctuary. Since we created the larger office by combining what had been 2 Vestries, we have not had a space set up for informal prayer or for Sam to use as she prepares to lead worship or has confidential one-to-one meetings. We hope to start that in Spring next year.

We are already starting to plan the celebration of 60 years in this building over the weekend of June 14^{th} and 15^{th} . Note that in your diary, NOW! That is something we can all do together, not only on the weekend but also in the months before it. We can work together over various events generating fellowship, sharing some of the stories we have from years gone by and yes, raising lots of money to support our future and keep Trinity going for the next generation. These celebrations will create opportunities to involve the other regular users of the building as we invite them to worship with us. If you are still in touch with someone who has moved away, tell them about it. How lovely it would be to see them again.

The big thing for next year is of course that God willing and the skills of medical people, Rev Sam will be back in our midst, leading worship and everything else that we do. Until that happy day, be assured that the Stewards are all committed to lead us forward but we will need your help and support through prayer and sometimes your physical effort.

So, lots to be thankful for, lots to pray about, lots for us all to get involved with as we strive to live our declared Vision: **to be a welcoming Church seeking to live in the love of God and share the message of Jesus Christ** by offering a warm and genuine welcome, being more intentional about the people and organisations we meet, by underpinning everything we do in prayer and so importantly, being guided and inspired by the Holy Spirit.

Greetings in Christ!

We are the Chinese congregation meeting at Woking Trinity Methodist Church. Over the past three years, many of us have migrated from Hong Kong to the UK, joining this wonderful church community. As part of this journey, we would like to share more about our experiences and introduce a new fellowship we have formed.

Our congregation is made up of young couples with children as well as retired couples. For many of the women in our group, moving to the UK has brought significant and drastic changes to our roles and daily lives. In Hong Kong, many of us worked full-time and were financially independent. Household chores, such as cooking, cleaning, and childcare, were often supported by helpers from the Philippines or Indonesia. However, life in the UK is very different. Most of us are now full-time homemakers, caring for our children and families without external help. Many of us have never cooked or cleaned extensively before, which has been a steep learning curve. Becoming financially dependent on our husbands has also brought new challenges, along with the sense of isolation from leaving behind our parents, churches, and support networks in Hong Kong.

In response to these needs, we have started the **Esther Fellowship**, a ministry dedicated to supporting the women in our congregation. Through studying the Bible and praying together, we aim to walk alongside one another in Jesus' love, encouraging each other to face these challenges with faith and hope. Our goal is not only to strengthen ourselves but also to bring our families closer to Jesus. Our first meeting on 27 October 2024 was a blessing, with over 30 attendees.

We plan to meet monthly and ask for your prayers as we continue to grow together in Christ. Thank you for your support and love.

I'd note that no table got all the answers correct – which suggests the level of complexity was right. A huge thank you to Marian.

We end our parties with a sing along. This was ably led by our musicians. Our guests were then collected by their chauffeurs. Thank you for all those who volunteered to

gives our guests a lift. Despite being the largest party for a while, we only needed to hire one taxi. We had a small surplus from the donated taxi fund which we have repurposed towards the flowers on a Sunday morning.

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'Lord teach us to pray' (Luke 11:1b) Part Two



In the September 2023 issue of TNV I wrote the first part of this article and promised to follow that up by considering praying in times of difficulty.

At this point in time as a church community at Trinity we are going through a time of examination and reexamination of the role and purpose of our Mission; difficult decisions need to be made about reducing costs and developing the role of volunteers to ensure the continuity of our Mission to meet the needs of both congregation and community.



Simple Prayer Window at Holy Trinity Church Bladon, Oxfordshire At critical times in his ministry Jesus faced real difficulties and threats but he always found time and a place to pray to his Abba Father. Often on his own, sometimes with his disciples. Today, we all need to pray earnestly for inspiration and vision for the future!

Some of you may be unsure how to go about this. There are two basic levels of approach, individually or

collectively. You may say that I do pray individually at home and collectively in Worship and that is right and good. But in times like now we need to pray with a focus on a regular basis – as a church we need to focus our prayers on the future of Trinity and its Mission.

Prayer can be both a personal and corporate conversation with our 'Lord' guided by the Holy Spirit, as we bring our personal prayers and those of a wider scope in petition.

You may not be aware that we have a small number of people who belong to the Trinity Church Prayer Group – in order to focus our prayers, we pray to a regular pattern. We want to expand the group to enable focused prayer to be undertaken by more people in a group and/or individually.

At the moment we meet face to face, on the first and third Fridays of the month in the Prayer Room, adjacent to the Narthex. We share Coffee/Tea and a biscuit and fellowship.

We open with a Prayer of the Day from the Circuit Prayer Diary and the Methodist Prayer Handbook. This is followed by a short devotional Reading and Prayer. Prayer topics are arranged in groups –

- Prayers of Thanksgiving where members share their personal thanks for whatever is laid on their hearts.
- Requests from the Prayer Tree which have asked for specific prayers
- Prayers from Pastoral Visits and direct requests are shared.
- Prayers for the Worship, Ministry and Mission of the Church including those involved in leading it and the group activities, throughout the week,
- We pray for our tenants and their role in our Mission:

- The Local Community Woking Churches Together and Woking People of Faith, World Day of Prayer, also various organisations eg Foodbank, Citizen's Advice, Borough Council activities, ROC Woking.
- For our Government and the wider world and its needs.

Members contribute as they feel led by the Holy Spirit; and total confidentiality is maintained. The session closes with a Prayer and the Grace.

Weeks 2 and 5 of our corporate time of Prayer are on WhatsApp and anyone who wishes to join in that Group should contact Jean Normington. On Weeks 4 in 5 Friday Bible Study meets. For more information contact Peggy Boorman.

Prayer topics are also displayed on the Notice Boards and tables around the Church and a relevant topic is screened around the East Entrance and 'Café' area - eg Spring, -Easter - Pentecost – Harvest – Remembrance - Advent – Christmas. Every contribution is respected and supported – as a church we need you to pray with us for the future Mission of our Church and Circuit

Please feel free to join us, as a taster. *There is only one prerequisite for prayer: that you come as you are – as we all do! (Victoria Lorenzato)*. God bless you all in this coming New Year and we look forward to meeting you and sharing prayer together

The Unity Band – 20 Year Anniversary Abridged / updated version of words shared by Graham Kirby-Smith at Foundry Worship, on 29th Sept 2024

Back in 1997 in Canterbury, Martin and Gina Graham ran their first **free street barbecue** and, to quote from onthemoveeast.org, "*discovered a whole new way of reaching people. It was effective and fun. They wrote about it in their book 'Sizzling Faith'*".

At some point they decided to take this initiative to other towns and cities, and so in 2001, they set up a charity called **`On The Move**'. Here's how it worked, according to the On The Move East website: *"We partner with local churches (of any denomination) to make it happen. Church volunteers become part of our team, giving out invitations, serving food, playing or singing in the bands, or as table hosts, chatting and befriending. Often conversations will end up being about faith, personal issues and sometimes end with prayer".*

One of the things I really like about this is that it was **ecumenical** – people from different churches serving together.

In 2004, '**On The Move**' came to **Woking**! The free BBQ was held in the town square, and there were several bands around the town, including town square, Peacocks food court, the old bandstand next to Toys R Us, we were on Commercial Way, and I believe Mike Cope was in a band at Wolsey shopping centre outside Sainsburys.

From the musical point of view, someone must have gathered up all the names of the



instrumentalists and singers who wanted to take part, and separated them out into the different bands. And so I found myself put in a band with people I didn't know – from Woking Vineyard, New Life, Christ Church, Salvation Army and St Marks Westfield. Quite an age range too – from 12 to 60s!

The band was led by Annie, who now often plays at Foundry Worship. We really gelled – I believe we were the only band who stuck together after the event. At some point, we decided to call ourselves the **'Unity**' band, and I have found a possible printed vision statement:

"Woking Christians seeking to enhance Woking worship on behalf of Woking churches to express Woking unity".

It was during those early rehearsals that I discovered **prayer** can include **laughter**, and talking to God just sounded natural – no need to use fancy words. We often used to have a pray in the middle of our rehearsals, and laughter was quite common! I always think there should

be *more joy* in worship, in prayer, in services. (At 'Spring Harvest' this year, I experienced a very loud communal prayer session, with growing music behind it. I felt I engaged in prayer much better that way!)

Over the years, some band members have come and gone, some have stayed – I believe we've had about **20 people** from at least **10 churches** involved in the band, including Woking URC, St Andrews & The Coign / Welcome Church and the churches I mentioned earlier.

There have been many highlights across the years. We're probably best known for leading worship at the **Good Friday Act of Witness** in the town square, from 2005 to




2023! We also played at various *Churches Together* services, *Street Angels* Commissioning Services, local church services (including one 'Unity' themed morning service at Trinity), and we've done a couple of **album recordings** – there are still some CDs available!

One that stands out to me is from 2014, on the year of our 10th anniversary. In commemoration of a time when the goodness of God was shining out of the darkness from 100 years earlier, during the 1st World War, when soldiers from both sides sang carols and played football together at Christmas time, *Churches Together in Woking* organised and asked us to play at an event called **'Silent Night'**, at Woking Football Stadium.

On this, our 20th anniversary, we have decided to come to the end of our time playing together as a band, by playing at a great fundraising event in August for Annie's charity '**Be More Josie**', and finally a wonderful celebration at *Foundry Worship* here at Trinity.



Being a part of the **'Unity**' band for 20 years has been such a blessing. So much has happened in those years – highs and lows – and the Unity band has always been a safe, joyful place. I hope we have been a vessel for blessing to others.
